The official Emirates Bird Records Committee (EBRC) checklist.

Last updated 2 August 2025 (by OJ Campbell)

The official Emirates Bird Records Committee (EBRC) checklist follows AviList (see www.avilist.org). However, please note that at the time of writing, sequence, nomenclature and systematics are in the process of being updated to follow AviList so the present list is not yet in perfect alignment.

475 Category A, B and C species have been recorded in the UAE. Note that this total includes one species (Red-whiskered Bulbul) that was formerly Category C (but is now extinct and has been moved to Category E) as well as two species complexes (Brown / South Polar Skua and Frigatebird sp. that were not identified to species).

This checklist was prepared from the UAE national records database that is maintained by the Emirates Bird Recorder, Tommy Pedersen, assisted by fellow current members of the EBRC.

The contribution made by past EBRC members is also gratefully acknowledged, especially that from the previous UAE Bird Recorder, Colin Richardson, and long-serving former EBRC members Steve James and Nick Moran.

The concise checklist - all categories

Definitions

Species abundance is classified according to the likelihood of seeing that species on any given visit to the appropriate habitat during the appropriate season.

- Species recorded on 20 or fewer occasions and less than annual in occurrence. Such species generally require substantiation on a Rare

Bird Report form (see above).

Rare - Species with more than 20 recent records (averaging one a year or more, even if not annual).

Uncommon - Typically recorded on less than 10% of visits.
 Fairly common - Typically recorded on 10-50% of visits.
 Common - Typically recorded on 51-90% of visits.

Very common - Typically recorded on more than 90% of visits.

Category A - Species occurring in an apparently natural, wild state on at least one occasion.

Category A species are included in the total UAE List.

Category B - Species recorded in to the UAE prior to or during the earliest years of systematic bird recording in the country for which no supporting documentation exists, but, based on the distinctiveness of the species and the credentials of the observers responsible, are considered extremely unlikely to be the result of mis-identification or confusion with similar species.

Category B species are included in the UAE List.

Category C - Species introduced (or probably introduced) by man and have subsequently established breeding populations that are now deemed self-sustaining. Category C species are included in the UAE List.

This is the eBird's Exotic Species Category Naturalized. Three years prior to becoming Naturalized, the species is Provisional.

An introduced species can not go from **Escapee** to **Provisional** and back to **Escapee**. The term **Provisional** will only be assigned to birds that have reached the rank of **Naturalized**, and will be assigned in retrospect. A species can go from **Escapee** to **Provisional** to **Naturalized** and back to **Escapee**. This will be decided by the EBRC.

Category D - Species that would otherwise appear in Category A, except that there is reasonable doubt that they have occurred naturally.

Category D species are not included in the UAE list.

This is the eBird's Exotic Species Category **Provisional**.

Category E - Species that have been recorded as introductions or escapees from captivity, with breeding populations, if any, that are thought not to be self-sustaining. Category E species are not included in the UAE list.

Category E species that have bred in the wild in the UAE are designated as E*.

This is the eBird's Exotic Species Category Escapee.

Category F - Species that either:

- · were reported prior to the establishment of systematic ornithological record keeping in the UAE, or
- were reported and initially accepted, but which, following a review of the record(s), are no longer deemed to be sufficiently documented for a certain identification to be upheld.

Unlike species in Category B, species in Category F are invariably ones that are very difficult to identify, needing detailed and precise documentation and, in many cases, are species in which identification criteria have been subject to evolution and refinement in recent years. Whilst it is likely that some or all Category F species have indeed occurred in a natural, wild state at least once, there is insufficient evidence to admit them to Category A.

Category F species are not included in the UAE List.

The Emirates Bird Records Committee

The EBRC exists so that ornithologists and interested amateurs can use bird records from the UAE database, from which this checklist is compiled, as a reliable reference, knowing that they are supported with documentation, in so far as is possible, and that they have been carefully screened. For this reason alone, the EBRC strives to be as fastidious as possible in judging records, especially of rare and difficult to identify species.

Records are judged on their individual merit. Decisions are a considered opinion as to whether a particular record carries enough evidence to reliably support the identification and do not represent an assessment of the observer. A verdict of "not proven" usually does not mean that the Committee believes the observer was mistaken; rather that Committee considers that the evidence presented is simply insufficient to establish the identification beyond reasonable doubt.

A number of species occurring as vagrants to the UAE are extremely similar to congeners and / or involve subspecies or populations from regions of the Palearctic that are not well studied by ornithologists. Observers submitting records of such species are advised that only extremely detailed, well-documented records that have been compiled from in-depth observations are likely to reach the required standard. For any record to be accepted, all members of the EBRC need to assess it and vote, and a unanimous or 4:1 majority decision in favour of acceptance has to be reached.

Ideally, the Committee seeks to receive records as soon after the original sighting as possible, ideally within 4 weeks. The 'field description' should be based on field-notes taken during the observation or very soon afterwards, preferably written without reference to identification literature. Such literature can be referred to elsewhere in the RBR, for example in the section for characters used to eliminate similar species. Any field-sketches made, or photographs taken, no matter however rudimentary, are often invaluable in evaluating records.

EBRC review of records, 2015-2016.

During the course of 2015–2016, EBRC carried out a review of archived records and categorisation. The main aspects and conclusions of this review are briefly outlined below.

All records available for eleven species where recent submissions of the same or similar species had either raised potential identification issues or where there were a number of historical records of species known to be very difficult to identify and apparently now much rarer than in the past were fully reviewed and reassessed. The species involved were:

Greater Scaup Aythya marila
Swinhoe's Storm Petrel Oceanodroma monorhis
Lesser Spotted Eagle Clanga pomarina
Asian House Martin Delichon dasypus
Brown-throated Martin Riparia paludicola
Blyth's Reed Warbler Acrocephalus dumetorum
Booted Warbler Iduna caligata
Hume's Whitethroat Curruca althaea
Finsch's Wheatear Oenanthe finschii
Blackstart Oenanthe melanura
European Pied Flycatcher Ficedula hypoleuca

This aspect of the review has resulted in a significant change to the known status of several of these species in the UAE; those affected are clearly indicated in the annotated list below. EBRC wishes to stress that the outcomes from this current review in no way reflect adversely on the observers involved or on previous decisions made by the committee. In the vast majority of cases, it was considered that the evidence available was simply insufficient to be certain that the species was indeed what

was claimed; only in very few cases was there evidence that misidentification was likely. Some of the species involved were believed, at the time of observation, to be scarce rather than rare and thus, observers may have been required to provide less detail than they might otherwise have done. Further, in some cases, records were not documented at all. Almost all of the species involved in this review are difficult or extremely difficult to identify in a vagrant context and require extremely detailed documentation. Unfortunately, this was not always available and, in those circumstances, it was deemed that, regrettably, the record had to be considered not proven. EBRC would be delighted to reconsider any of the records involved in the light of additional evidence being forthcoming. Observers are encouraged to submit any such evidence directly to the Chairman. Such evidence will be filed and, if appropriate, the record reviewed again.

As a consequence of this review, EBRC have added a new category, Category F, as defined above. Two species considered in the recent review are now in Category F, along with a number of other species, all of which are very difficult to identify, that predate systematic ornithological recording in the UAE. The species in Category F are as follows:

Eastern Bonelli's Warbler *Phylloscopus orientalis* Finsch's Wheatear *Oenanthe finschii* Northern Raven *Corvus corax*

Furthermore, a review of the archived data also revealed a number of historical records for which no documentary evidence exists. However, given the distinctiveness of the species involved and the credentials of the observers, it was considered highly unlikely that these records could be the result of mis-identification or confusion with similar species. Since many of the records concerned predate the formation of a systematic documentation process, and given the potential difficulties in acquiring further information from observers who no longer reside in the UAE, the decision has been taken to retain these records on the UAE Bird List but to place them in Category B (see definition above). These species are listed below and the relevant records annotated as undocumented in the detailed species accounts with a double asterisk **:

Grey-headed Kingfisher *Halcyon leucocephala* Eyebrowed Thrush *Turdus obscurus* Yellowhammer *Emberiza citrinella*

Finally, the designation of species in Categories C, D and E was reviewed, resulting in a small number of changes.

As of 1 Jan 2016, Pin-tailed Sandgrouse *Pterocles alchata* and Superb Starling *Lamprotornis superbus* were elevated from Category E to C following evidence of breeding and sustained or increasing population, whilst all future Red-whiskered Bulbul *Pycnonotus jocosus* records are now to be classed as Category E on evidence of a marked decline in the former population, of which there has been an absence of records since 2014.

Update 16 Jan 2022; Black Francolin *Francolinus*, See-see Partridge *Ammoperdix griseogularis* and African Sacred Ibis *Threskiornis aethiopicus* were elevated from Category E to C following evidence of breeding and sustained or increasing population, see the individual species for more information.

UAE National Red List of Birds (2018-2020)

During the course of 2018-2020, BirdLife International and IUCN, on behalf of the UAE Ministry of Climate Change and Environment, carried out a national Red List assessment of 170 species of birds regularly breeding in the UAE, or regularly visiting during migration or winter. For all species assessed, an attempt was made to estimate the national population size, and this number has been included in the checklist that follows. All population size ranges presented for either breeding or non-breeding birds are expressed as numbers of mature individuals (not as pairs). EBRC and the compilers of this checklist are most grateful to all at BirdLife International and IUCN who worked on this project, with particular thanks to Rob Sheldon, Ian Burfield, James Westrip, David Allen and Maxim Koshkin.

Cotton Pygmy Goose Nettapus coromandelianus

Mute Swan Cygnus olor

Vagrant.

- 1. One adult, two immatures Abu Dhabi; Eastern Lagoon (sewage farm) 13 Dec 1984 (M Crumbie et al).
- 2. Six birds (two groups of three) flying near Bahrani Island 8 Dec 1993 (per N.Cochrane-Dyet).
- 3. Two Abu Dhabi; Eastern Lagoon 15 Oct 2000 (C.Band).
- 4. Three immatures Al Warsan Lakes (Wimpey Pits) 24 Dec 2002-8 Mar 2003, with two birds present to 21 Mar 2003 (T Pedersen et al).
- 5. Two immatures Jebel Dhanna--plantation 15 Dec 2017 (K Al Dhaheri).
- 6. Two adults Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary--Lagoon Hide 7 Jan 2019 (F Itani), presumed same Bhalghelam Island 11 Jan 2019 (NP Williams, P Hellyer).

Records of this species are particularly difficult to categorise with regard to origin and some of the foregoing records may in fact relate to escaped birds. The following records are believed to be almost certainly of non-wild origin:

- A flock of up to 19 birds Abu Dhabi; Al Reem Island and Eastern Lagoon 18 May 2008 onwards (R Hornby et al).
- One International Media Production Zone 4-12 Mar 2010 (M Smiles et al) and two Jumeirah Golf Estate 3 Jun 2010 (G Talbot), probable escapes.
- Up to 10 Al Marmoom DCR area April 2013 onwards.

Bewick's Swan Cygnus columbianus bewickii

Vagrant.

1. Two Nad al-Sheba area 25 Jan-8 Feb 1994 (C Richardson et al). Site now called Meydan Horse Race and Golf Club.

Four unidentified swans had been reported same locality from mid-December 1993 by local worker.

Origin uncertain:

One adult Fujairah Tennis Club Dam 17-21 Jun 2013 (J Judas et al). Free-flying, no ring and no damage to wings.

Whooper Swan Cygnus cygnus

Vagrant.

1. Five ad. and one imm. Al Warsan Lakes (Wimpey Pits) 1 Jan-16 Mar 2003, four birds 20-28 Mar 2003; single adult 31 Mar-15 Apr 2003 (P Bourdin, J Ward et al).

Releases documented:

- One Sir Bani Yas 31 Aug-2 Sep 1989.

Greylag Goose (Eastern) Anser anser rubrirostris

Uncommon and irregular winter visitor, November to March, rarely to April; injured birds have oversummered. Released and domestic birds regularly seen.

Lesser White-fronted Goose Anser erythropus

Vagrant.

- 1. One immature Umm al-Qaiwain Rubbish Tip 20 Nov 1996 (M Tunturi), same bird Ramtha Rubbish Tip 5 Dec 1996-14 Mar 1997 (SL James, C Richardson et al).

Greater White-fronted Goose Anser albifrons

Uncommon to rare winter visitor; extreme dates 3 November and 4 April. Highest count 68 at The Montgomerie; Emirates Hills Golf Course 7 Dec 2010.

Egyptian Goose *Alopochen aegyptiaca* (Category C)

First UAE record; Four Abu Dhabi; Eastern Lagoon 16 Feb 1979 (JNB Brown, R Western). Feral population on Sir Bani Yas since 1980, now widespread throughout the country. First confirmed breeding (away from Sir Bani Yas): Abu Dhabi island, 1989 (JNB Brown).

Common Shelduck Tadorna tadorna

Localised winter visitor, usually in small numbers (but recent increase noted), October to mid-April with peak January to early March. Peak count 270, Al Wathba Wetland Reserve 28 Jan 2017. Total non-breeding population estimated as 200-300 with apparent increase noted in recent years.

Summer records assumed to refer to escaped birds. Released birds Al Marmoom DCR Dec 2013 onwards.

Ruddy Shelduck Tadorna ferruginea

Rare to uncommon visitor, October to mid-May, has summered. Max count 30 Khor al-Beida 30 Oct 2010 (OJ Campbell et al).

The potential for escaped birds should be noted as this species is frequent in private collections and the species appears to have been deliberately released in the Al Marmoom--general area (Dubai) from (at least) 2019.

Red-breasted Merganser Mergus serrator

Vagrant.

- 1. Two South Furayjidat Island 29 Oct 1972 (J Stewart-Smith).

Marbled Duck Marmaronetta angustirostris

Vagrant. However, birds released at the Al Marmoom DCR area from 2016 onwards now breed annually and presumably, at least sometimes, will wander to much more distant sites. This means that determination of vagrants of all records prior to 2016 is now effectively impossible.

Red-crested Pochard Netta rufina

Rare winter visitor. However, birds released at the Al Marmoom DCR area from 2016 onwards have bred and presumably, at least sometimes, will wander to much more distant sites. This means that determination of wild winter visitors has become effectively impossible.

Common Pochard Aythya ferina

Fairly common but localised migrant and winter visitor; mainly October to March; has oversummered. Total non-breeding population estimated as 200-500.

Ferruginous Duck Aythya nyroca

Rather uncommon and local winter visitor but seemingly increasing; occasional summer records. Total non-breeding population estimated as 10-50. Releases noted in Al Marmoom DCR (at least a few individuals now present here all year) and Ajman Water Treatment Plant (breeding May 2021 onwards).

Tufted Duck Aythya fuligula

Uncommon migrant and winter visitor; occasional summer records.

Greater Scaup Aythya marila

Northern Shoveler Anas clypeata

Locally common to very common migrant and winter visitor; occasional in summer. Total non-breeding population estimated as 1,000-3,000.

Gadwall Anas strepera

Uncommon to fairly common migrant and winter visitor, but seldom numerous.

Eurasian Wigeon Anas penelope

Uncommon to fairly common migrant and winter visitor; has oversummered.

Mallard Anas platyrhynchos

Common migrant and winter visitor. Introduced birds breeding since at least the 1980s. Total non-breeding population estimated as 1,000-2,000.

Northern Pintail Anas acuta

Common migrant and winter visitor; has oversummered. Total non-breeding population estimated as 200-300.

Green-winged Teal Anas crecca

The subspecies occurring is Eurasian Teal Anas crecca crecca

Common to very common migrant and winter visitor. Total non-breeding population estimated as 2,000-5,000.

Grey Francolin Francolinus pondicerianus (Category C)

Very common and widely released; doubtfully native.

Black Francolin Francolinus francolinus

Feral populations common but restricted to Sir Bani Yas. Released early 1980s, breeding confirmed 1991 onwards (SJ Aspinall).

Also breeding Abu al-Abyadh Island 1991–98; releases on Balghelam Island did not survive.

Elevated to Category C status from 2006 onwards.

See-see Partridge Ammoperdix griseogularis

Feral populations fairly common in the central areas of Sir Bani Yas since at least 1989, breeding early 1990's onwards.

Elevated to Category C status from 2010 onwards.

Sand Partridge Ammoperdix heyi

Fairly common and widespread mountain resident. Population estimated to number 2,000-20,000.

Common Quail Coturnix coturnix

Regular passage migrant; few in winter and summer. May breed.

Releases: Tens of thousands of individuals are captive-bred in the UAE each year but no strong evidence that many escape or are released.

Chukar Partridge *Alectoris chukar*

First UAE record from Fujairah emirate 27 Apr 1987 (L & R Western).

Uncommon resident in Ra's al-Khaimah mountains north of Dibba and Masafi area; much more common in the Wadi Bih area than elsewhere.

Wild population estimated to number less than 250.

Feral releases elsewhere; for example, 500 birds released in the Al Ain area 2012.

Little Grebe Tachybaptus ruficollis

Common resident: locally common migrant and winter visitor.

Recent colonist, first confirmed breeding: Kalba, April 1989 and then marked increase. Breeding population estimated to number 600-1,000.

Great Crested Grebe Podiceps cristatus

Black-necked Grebe Podiceps nigricollis

Locally common migrant and winter visitor. Breeding confirmed Al Wathba Wetland Reserve, 2000 (A Abdi).

Greater Flamingo Phoenicopterus roseus

Common migrant and winter visitor. Ringing recoveries mainly from Iranian colonies, but also Mediterranean Turkey (K Hyland *pers. comm.*) and Sicily where a juv was ringed on nest 7 Jul 2021 and photographed Al Rafa'a shoreline 24 Nov 2021 (L Esselen).

First confirmed successful breeding UAE at Al Wathba Wetland Reserve January 1999; creche of 10 juveniles 10 February 1999. Has bred two other sites, including large colony discovered Bu Al Syayif Marine Protected Area, near Abu Dhabi April 2009, with at least 290 chicks raised (per EAD).

Now regularly breeding at Al Wathba Wetland Reserve; breeding population estimated as 1,600. Total non-breeding population estimated as 17,000-20,000.

Now very rare winter visitor and passage migrant, October to March, however it is now impossible to distinguish genuinely wild bird from those released. Reintroduced Abu Dhabi emirate since 2004, where has since bred successfully. Un-ringed releases until at least 2010.

A total of 4,400 birds released 2004-2012, with 1,292 birds released in the 2011/12 season alone.

Hundreds of birds released March/April 2013. The species now also regularly breeds in Dubai emirate.

Little Bustard Tetrax tetrax

Vagrant.

Regularly released in the deserts around Dubai, where now established and breeding. Elevated to Category C from 2016 onwards.

Max count 800 birds Saih as Sidirah desert 5 Nov 2010 (OJ Campbell).

Also recorded Abu Dhabi, Das Island and Wamm farms in small numbers. Origin of birds away from the deserts south of Dubai unclear.

Thousands in captive breeding programs.

Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouse Pterocles exustus erlangeri

This subspecies-group is called Chestnut-bellied Sandgrouse (Arabian).

Common but declining resident. Population estimated as 200-2000.

Locally fairly common breeding visitor, April to September, and scarce migrant. Breeding population estimated as 1,000-2,000.

Over 1,200 recorded previously at former Al Wathba Camel Race Track fodder fields in early autumn; very few flocks exceeding 150 in recent years, (but see below) and most counts very small.

Apparent releases (situation unclear) in the Al Marmoom DCR area, where now breeds commonly; and autumn build-ups have reached counts of 1640 (September 2022); winter records are noted.

Eurasian Collared Dove Streptopelia decaocto

Abundant; few records prior to 1977 but has spread massively since then. Population estimated as 200,000-2,000000.

Common Wood Pigeon Columba palumbus

Vagrant (?) but now widely released across Greater Dubai area and breeding; it is now effectively impossible to ascertain if any Common Woodpigeon in the UAE is a genuine vagrant.

Corncrake Crex crex

First UAE record Abu Dhabi Island 30 Oct 1987 (JM Hollingworth, C Overall).

Rare migrant, April to May and September to November.

Spotted Crake Porzana porzana

Uncommon migrant and winter visitor, September to May.

Bred successfully Al Ghazal Golf Club, March 2010 (T Evans, T Smith); first UAE breeding record.

Common Moorhen Gallinula chloropus

Localised breeding resident; uncommon migrant and winter visitor. Resident population estimated as 1,000-3,000.

Recent colonist, first confirmed breeding: Kalba (rubbish dump at Khatmat Milaha border post) and Sharjah, April 1989.

Eurasian Coot Fulica atra

Locally common migrant and winter visitor; but locally now a breeding resident. Resident population estimated as 50-100.

Breeding confirmed Al Warsan Lakes (Wimpey Pits) 2002 onwards; since approximately 2010, has also become an annual and common breeder at Al Wathba Wetland Reserve.

Red-knobbed Coot Fulica cristata

Vagrant.

One adult Al Marmoom DCR--Al Qudra Lake 15-17 Aug 2018 (R Khan et al) - showing worn and damaged plumage indicating having been caged and released/escaped.

White-tailed Lapwing Vanellus leucurus

Mainly a (very) localised resident breeder, perhaps also a rare migrant and winter visitor, August to April. A recent colonist, (first confirmed breeding: Ajman, 1996) and now a very local breeding resident. Breeding population is estimated to number 20-50; total non-breeding population assumed to fall in the range 50-249 (but likely closer to lower end of this estimate).

Caspian Plover Charadrius asiaticus

Uncommon migrant, late August to early October; scarcer in spring, late February to April. Rare January, May and June.

Tibetan Sand Plover Charadrius atrifrons

C. a. pamirensis and possibly C. a. atrifrons ocurring.

Very common passage migrant and winter visitor with peak in April and October; some oversummer. Total non-breeding population estimated as 4,000-10,000.

Greater Sand Plover Charadrius leschenaultii

Subspecies occurring not completely resolved; vast majority large billed so presumably *C.I. scythicus* (formerly *crassirostris*); occurrence of western *C.I. columbinus* not certain but feasible.

Great Knot Calidris tenuirostris

Bridled Tern Onychoprion anaethetus

Returns to Arabian Gulf breeding sites from late February; post-breeding dispersal from early June.

Migrant on the East coast, probably scarce but should be checked for, especially late Feb to March and June to July (when Arabian Gulf breeders disperse).

Apparently completely absent throughout winter (early October to late February); seemingly rare or very rare from August onwards. No confirmed inland records.

Caspian Tern Hydroprogne caspia

Common passage migrant and winter visitor, recorded all months; has bred (and may do so regularly in remote parts of the Western Region). Breeding population estimated as 2-40, and is probably (much) closer to the lower limit. Total non-breeding population estimated as 100-300, almost exclusively along the Arabian Gulf coastline.

- Birds showing characters of integrades of *S. hirundo hirundo/tibetana* and the eastern group *S. hirundo longipennis* are common in spring, with varying red base to the dark bill. Some birds that appear to very closely match pure *S. hirundo longipennis* have been recorded (for example birds with all-black bills have been documented with photographs) although the occurrence of genuine *longipennis* seems highly unlikely on geographic grounds.

The subspecies *minussensis*, with range "C Asia to s Tibet; winters Indian Ocean", is considered to be a junior synonym of subspecies *tibetana* (Nisbet et al. 2017), and has been removed from the UAE list.

White-cheeked Tern Sterna repressa

Persian Shearwater Puffinus persicus

Purple Heron Ardea purpurea

Fairly common migrant, recorded all months. Breeding recorded Al Ain 20 Aug 2012 (J Judas).

Grey Heron Ardea cinerea

Very common migrant and winter visitor, some oversummer. Total non-breeding population estimated to number 500-1,000.

European Nightjar Caprimulgus europaeus

Several subspecies likely occurring, but no definite determination.

Common migrant April to May, once June, and September to mid-November, rare December-January .

Egyptian Nightjar Caprimulgus aegyptius

Scarce and local breeding resident but seemingly increasing; very uncommon migrant and formerly regular, very localised winter visitor, September to early May. One juvenile found in Ajban, Abu Dhabi emirate 14 Jun 2013 represents the first UAE breeding record (M Almazrouei).

Breeding confirmed again March 2016 with adult on nest with two eggs, and again April 2017 at same site; bird with young found Al-Marmoom DCR area July 2023. Breeding population estimated as 10-50 but likely under-recorded. Communal roosts from late spring to early autumn know from multiple sites, including where breeding recorded; maximum count 122 (including 113 in one roost), July 2023.

Whilst the identity of each record as Fork-tailed Swift *Apus pacificus* is not in doubt, in the absence of photographs it proved impossible to definitively assign any of the records to subspecies. Common Swift Apus apus

Uncommon migrant, late February (rarely mid Feb) to early May with a peak in April, scarce in autumn. One December record. Birds of the subspecies *Apus apus pekinensis* identified.

Pallid Swift Apus pallidus

Very common migrant and breeding visitor. Nests from November to April/May, uncommon to rare from June to September / October when most depart (to locations unkown). Population estimated as 2,000-20,000.

Western Barn Owl Tyto alba erlangeri

Uncommon to rare breeding resident. Population estimated as 100-300 but likely under-recorded.

Little Owl Athene noctua

Formerly a fairly common resident, records indicate a decline. Population estimated as 2,000-10,000.

Subspecies unknown, possibly *A. n. saharae* and/or *A. n. lilith* involved, but the assignment of individuals to any Little Owl subspecies on morphological data appears to be a very difficult task. Darker birds generally found in the UAE mountains, paler and sandier birds in the desert.

Eurasian Scops Owl Otus scops

Pharaoh Eagle-Owl Bubo ascalaphus

Uncommon to fairly common breeding resident. Population estimated as 50-100 but likely under-recorded.

Arabian Eagle-Owl Bubo milesi

Rare resident in Hajar mountains; population recently discovered.

Former vagrant, increasingly reported 2015 onwards and now an uncommon but widely spread resident, although rare in the Western Region of Abu Dhabi Emirate. Has bred regularly at one site from 2018-2020; and nest-building recorded (October 2018) at a second site.

Egyptian Vulture Neophron percnopterus

Non-breeding resident, rarely observed away from Jebel Hafit, Al Ain; possibly also rare migrant. Counts of up to 100 non-breeders noted here in the past but generally lower numbers in recent years; some evidence of a marked decline but much variation in numbers.

Breeding, long suspected at Jebel Hafit, finally confirmed May 2017 (NP Williams et al) and may occur annually there.

European Honey Buzzard Pernis apivorus

Rare migrant. One confirmed winter record.

Confusion with Crested Honey Buzzard evident.

Crested Honey Buzzard (Northern) Pernis ptilorhynchus orientalis

Uncommon to locally common, mainly late autumn migrant and winter visitor until May. Regular at favoured sites; mainly parks in urban and suburban areas. Rare but annual in summer.

Restocking of certain areas with game has likely encouraged this species to occur and linger more frequently. 10-50 are estimated to occur annually.

Short-toed Snake Eagle Circaetus gallicus

Uncommon migrant and winter visitor; recorded all months. Has bred (Ras Al Khaimah). Total non-breeding population estimated as 10 or less.

Common migrant and winter visitor, late September to late April. Occasionally oversummers. Total non-breeding population is estimated to number 50-100. The pale form *fulvescens* rarely recorded.

Bonelli's Eagle Aquila fasciatus

Montagu's Harrier Circus pygargus

Uncommon migrant and rare winter visitor; occasional in summer.

Western Marsh Harrier Circus aeruginosus

Very common migrant and winter visitor, recorded all months but mainly present September to March. Total non-breeding population estimated to number 100-300; several annual roosts of 20 birds or more.

Black Kite Milvus migrans

Uncommon migrant and winter visitor. Note that the vast majority of individuals of this species occurring in the UAE show characters resembling (often strongly) Black-eared Kite *M.* (*migrans*) lineatus which is part of the lineatus/formosanus subspecies-group. However, it is deemed very likely, if not almost certain that all individuals occurring are actually intergades between lineatus and nominate migrans (which occur widely across central Asia, as far east as Mongolia) rather than pure lineatus; the occurrence of genuine, pure lineatus in the UAE seems (highly) unlikely geographically and has never been established, despite much reference to this subspecies in the past.

Eurasian Hoopoe Upupa epops

Very common migrant and locally common resident mainly, in northern and eastern UAE.Small numbers of birds winter in areas where breeding does not occur. Breeding population estimated to number 1,000-2.000.

Indian Roller Coracias benghalensis

Very common breeding resident in the northern Emirates and Al Ain area; range expanding. Population estimated as 5,000-15,000.

European Roller Coracias garrulus

Fairly common migrant, April to early May and mid-August to October. Formerly bred Ra's al-Khaimah but now likely extinct as a breeder. Former breeding population estimated to number 0-10.

White-throated Bee-eater Merops albicollis

Sooty Falcon Falco concolor

Very rare and highly endangered declining breeding visitor (5 nesting pairs in 2008; 2-3 nesting pairs in 2016 but probably none since and, as of 2025, probably extinct in UAE; source: Environment Agency-Abu Dhabi data) to offshore Arabian Gulf islands. Very rare migrant onshore.

Eurasian Hobby Falco subbuteo

Uncommon spring migrant April to May, and fairly common to common autumn migrant September to October.

Peregrine Falcon Falco peregrinus

- Barbary Falcon Falco peregrinus pelegrinoides

Rare breeding resident; perhaps also rare migrant. Breeding population estimated as up to 10; non-breeding population estimated as 20 or less. Northerly breeding birds are very uncommon migrants and winter visitors. Many records presumed to relate to escaped birds.

Lanner Falcon Falco biarmicus

Previously rare migrant and / or winter visitor, now vagrant. No recent records of any bird that showed any likelihood of being wild. Many records presumed to relate to escaped birds.

Saker Falcon Falco cherrug

Previously rare migrant and \bar{I} or winter visitor, now vagrant. No recent records of any bird that showed any likelihood of being wild. Many records clearly relate to escaped birds or to captive-bred hybrid Saker x Gyr *F. rusticolus*, and it is now not ordinarily possible to determine whether any bird may be of genuinely wild origin, even if apparently both a pure Saker and lacking jesses.

Alexandrine Parakeet Psittacula eupatria (Category C)

Widespread in urban centres; expanding since first records post 1988.

Ring-necked Parakeet Psittacula krameri (Category C)

Common resident; first records from early 1970s.

Eurasian Golden Oriole Oriolus oriolus

Uncommon to fairly common migrant, late April to May, occasionally in June and August to mid-October; rarely winter months. Indian Golden Oriole *O. kundoo* not reliably reported, but the winter records might be of this species.

Black-naped Oriole (East Asian) Oriolus chinensis diffusus

Isabelline Shrike Lanius isabellinus isabellinus

This subspecies is called Isabelline Shrike (Daurian).

Common migrant and winter visitor, October to April, scarce other months.

Desert Lark Ammomanes deserti

A. d. taimuri occurs as a common breeding resident to mountains and gravel plains.

A. d. insularis occurs very locally on coastal bluffs in the western Abu Dhabi emirate.

Breeding population estimated to number 10,000-20,000. Vast majority of these will be A. d. taimuri.

Black-crowned Sparrow-Lark *Eremopterix nigriceps*

Locally common resident; nomadic in flocks in autumn and winter. Breeding population estimated to number 10,000-20,000.

Oriental Skylark Alauda gulgula

Uncommon and localised migrant and winter visitor in very small numbers, most reliable in recent years at Wamm Farms, September to April. First record Ruwais 18 Nov 1991 (NARC).

Eurasian Skylark Alauda arvensis

Fairly common winter visitor, November to mid-March, rarely in April and October. Non-breeding population estimated to number 100-1,000.

Crested Lark Galerida cristata

Very common to abundant resident; numbers and range increasing. Breeding population estimated as 50,000-100,000.

Greater Short-toed Lark Calandrella brachydactyla

Subspecies artemisiana confirmed, and nominate brachydactyla presumed regular visitor.

Common migrant, mid-February to early April and mid-August to November; may have bred in very small numbers previously but no recent records of suspected breeders. Breeding population, if any still occur, estimated to number 1-10.

Bimaculated Lark Melanocorypha bimaculata

Uncommon migrant and localised winter visitor, November to mid-March. Recently, no regular wintering sites.

Locally, generally scarce migrant and winter visitor, September to April (mainly November to February). It is unclear what proportion belongs to *heinei* and possibly Mediterranean Short-toed *A. rufescens*, although occurrence of the later species is unconfirmed in the UAE.

Very localised (probably former) breeding visitor to coastal areas (exact taxa unknown); no recent records of suspected breeders.

Subspecies in the UAE:

A. heinei persica - s Iraq to s Afghanistan. UAE breeding birds probably belongs to this subspecies.

- large and heavy-billed, pale sandy gray above, tinged cinnamon, with narrow streaks, more sparsely streaked below

A. heinei heinei - possible winter visitor from e Turkey, Transcaucasia and Kazakhstan. Those from N parts of range winter S to Middle East.

- pale and grey to grey-brown with well-defined moderate streaking, whiter ground colour below.

A. heinei aharonii - possible winter visitor from c Turkey. Includes niethammeri.

- slightly paler and grayer than heinei, contrasting black streaks above, chest with thin short black streaks

Mediterranean Short-toed Lark Alaudala rufescens

A. rufescens minor - not reliably reported in the UAE after the recent split, but a possible winter visitor.

Breeds from Egypt to Turkey, Iraq, w Saudi Arabia. Those from N parts of range winter S to Middle East.

- buffish sandy to brownish, streaks above and below are small.

Delicate Prinia Prinia lepida

Very common breeding resident. Breeding population estimated to number 20,000-50,000.

Previously called Graceful Prinia (Prinia gracilis), which occurs in Bahrain and e Saudi Arabia; residents birds on Sila'a Peninsula confirmed as Delicate.

Upcher's Warbler Hippolais languida

Common spring migrant, late February to early May with a peak in mid April to early May; uncommon July to early October, rarely to December.

Booted Warbler Iduna caligata

Status of this species unclear, a number of early records prior to split from Sykes's Warbler *Iduna rama*; early records did not differentiate between the two. Formerly reported as a scarce migrant but very few records ever formally submitted and the very few documented claims are insufficient to establish the definite identity of the birds involved. Booted Warbler is likely to occur in the UAE and may even be a rare migrant rather than a vagrant but there is no evidence to support this contention.

Sykes's Warbler Iduna rama

Breeding resident in the Khor Kalba mangroves, with maximum of 15 pairs in 2000. However, given recent access issues, there have been few recent records. Historical records Ra's al-Khaimah Khor (specimen records), otherwise unrecorded away from Khor Kalba.

Eastern Olivaceous Warbler Iduna pallida

Common migrant, March to May and August to September, rarely winter; rare, very localised and declining breeding resident Abu Dhabi Island. Breeding population estimated to number 20-500; probably much closer to the lower end of that range.

Sedge Warbler Acrocephalus schoenobaenus

Uncommon to rare spring migrant mid-February to May, occasionally to June. Rare August to November.

Moustached Warbler Acrocephalus melanopogon

This subspecies is called Caspian Reed Warbler.

Resident and partial migrant breeder, and locally common passage visitor, late February to May and late July to early November.

Breeding population estimated to number 100-300.

Barn Swallow Hirundo rustica

Barn Swallow (White-bellied) H. rustica rustica

Common migrant and winter visitor; occurs all months but much scarcer June to August. Non-breeding population estimated to number 500-1,000. Breeding suspected occasionally over multiple years in northern Emirates, now confirmed;

Plain Leaf Warbler Phylloscopus neglectus

Fairly common to common winter visitor to mountain wadis, mid-October to end March. Small numbers regularly in plantations on Arabian Gulf coast in October; a few of which overwinter.

Willow Warbler Phylloscopus trochilus

Fairly common late spring migrant, late March to early June, rare mid-August to October.

Common Chiffchaff Phylloscopus collybita

Very common migrant and winter visitor, end October to early April. Single records to end-May.

There is anecdotal evidence that the majority of wintering birds are somewhat different in appearance from occasional big falls of migrants that appear some years in early to mid-March; in essence latter generally appear more obviously olive (less grey) tinged above and with more obvious yellow on underparts than normal wintering birds. Subspecies definitely identified are:

- P. c. menzbieri (seemingly the common wintering ssp; based on DNA analysis from birds trapped in March (1) and December (2))
- P. c. abietinus (seemingly a common spring migrant; one trapped March bird identified by DNA analysis).

Note that the usual, frequently heard contact call of the common wintering Chiffchaffs in the UAE, now presumed to be *menzbieri*, is <u>very</u> similar to Siberian *tristis*. However, song (heard regularly from wintering birds from January to March) is essentially the standard European song, and hence markedly different from *tristis*. This indicates that the vast majority of wintering birds, irrespective of call or appearance, are not *tristis*.

Siberian Chiffchaff P. c. tristis

Common native but seemingly declining breeding resident in the mountains and eastern part of the UAE. Breeding population estimated to number 2,000-10,000. Escaped birds noted in the cities of Abu Dhabi and Dubai.

Red-whiskered Bulbul *Pycnonotus jocosus* (Formerly Category C; population now extinct, now Category E)

Barred Warbler Curruca nisoria

Fairly common spring migrant in April and early May, rare August to November, but singletons recently recorded into January.

Lesser Whitethroat Curruca curruca

This species has been subject to much confusion in the past, as well as the present (!)

In the light of recent publications, based on genetic and isotopic analysis which incorporated birds sampled from the UAE, the formerly widely held assumption that *Curruca* (=*Sylvia*) *minula* was the default wintering taxon is now believed to be incorrect. Currently there is no compelling evidence that *C. minula* has actually occurred in the UAE.

Non-breeding population estimated to number 200-1,000, the vast majority of which would be C. c. halimodendri.

The current understanding of on the relative status of this species is as follows:

- Lesser Whitethroat (curruca/blythi) Curruca curruca curruca/blythi

Apparently a regular (possibly fairly common) migrant mid-February to mid-May and September to November. Uncommon in winter.

- Lesser Whitethroat (halimodendri) Curruca curruca halimodendri

Apparently a common winter visitor (and presumed migrant) mid-September to mid-April.

- Lesser Whitethroat (Hume's) Curruca curruca althaea

Rare to very rare migrant and winter visitor, confusion with other species of the Lesser Whitethroat-complex evident.

Eastern Orphean Warbler Curruca crassirostris

Common migrant February to May (mainly late April to May) and mid-August to October, rare in winter. Early spring migrants mostly resembly *C. c. icterops*; later spring bird seemingly involves nominate and/or *C. c. rubicola*.

Arabian Babbler Argya squamiceps

Common breeding resident, essentially north of a line from Abu Dhabi island to Al Ain only. Breeding population estimated to number 10,000-25,000.

Grey Hypocolius Hypocolius ampelinus

First UAE record Das Island 11 Apr 1987 (L Reaney).

Uncommon to fairly common (but very localised) migrant and winter visitor November to mid-April, with peak numbers typically in late winter/early spring. Non-breeding population estimated as 100-250.

The most regularly used site in recent years, Lulu Island, off Abu Dhabi Island has hosted up to 100 each year from November to March, since 2008 at least. However, in January 2020, most left this site and none were present for the remainder of the spring. Since then, has occurred November to January annually, but occurrence in February and March is now much more erratic than in the previous decade.

Common Starling Sturnus vulgaris

Fairly common winter visitor, November to February, occasionally other months.

Rufous-tailed Scrub Robin Cercotrichas galactotes

Uncommon migrant mid-April to late May, one July record; uncommon to rare migrant September to mid-November.

Common Nightingale Luscinia megarhynchos

Fairly common migrant, mainly late March to mid-May but also late August to mid-October. Occasional records mid-summer and overwintering.

- Common Nightingale (Eastern) Luscinia megarhynchos golzii group; most birds apparently belong to this sandy-coloured subspecies-group.
- Common Nightingale (Western) *Luscinia megarhynchos megarhynchos/africana*; this more rufous-coloured group is less common in the UAE than the Eastern group but *africana* certainly occurs and individuals have been recorded showing characters of nominate as well.

Bluethroat Luscinia svecica

Red-spotted Bluethroat, part of the *svecica* subspecies-group, is the commonly occurring group. Locally common migrant and winter visitor, September to April, but mainly from November to March. It is not clear if the subspecies involved are *svecica*, *volgae* or *pallidogularis* or most likely all.

Caucasian Bluethroat, monotypic member of the *luristanica* subspecies-group (formerly named *magna*).

Vagrant or rare spring migrant.

White-spotted Bluethroat.

Birds reported with a clear white throat-spot, which now are quite regularly seen in spring appear to resemble the western group White-spotted Bluethroat *L. s.* cyanecula/namnetum. The ssp. cyanecula in this group breeds as far east as SW Russia, and might wander south to the Arabian Peninsula in winter (?) although most are believed to winter in SW Europe and NW Africa.

However, a more easterly subspecies, L. s. abbotti, belonging to the Red-spotted Bluethroat svecica subspecies-group uncommonly shows a clear a white throat spot. It

breeds in the Himalayas, wintering to NW India and could conceiveably winter in eastern Arabia. It is not clear to which subspecies UAE records of white-spotted Bluethroats refer.

Uncommon migrant and winter visitor, mainly October to November. Rare on spring passage.

Siberian Stonechat Saxicola maurus

Relative proportions of subspecies involved not fully understood, as generally only males distinguishable subspecifically, and requiring close view (and ideally photographs). However both *S. m. maurus* and *S. m. hemprichii* (formerly termed *variegatus*) confirmed to regularly occur (mainly former). First record of *S. m. variegatus* (formerly termed *armenicus*) confirmed in 2018, but possibly a more frequent vagrant or even scarce migrant.

Siberian Stonechat (Siberian) S. maurus maurus

Fairly common migrant, Feb to Mar and smaller numbers Sep to Nov. Very scarce winter visitor.

Spring date range 6 Feb to 24 Mar. First recorded 17 Feb 2008, possibly overlooked prior to this.

No definite records prior to 2006, but occurrence long suspected and noted; many early records do not distinguish between this and the following species.

The first proven record since re-separation from Siberian Stonechat was a male at Dubai Pivot Fields 20 Jan-24 Feb 2006 (T Pedersen et al).

Hooded Wheatear Oenanthe monacha

Rare to scarce resident Jebel Hafit, rare resident elsewhere in Hajar chain; also rare migrant (including records from Arabian Gulf coastline). Breeding population uncertain (but estimated as 10-50 pairs in 1996).

Desert Wheatear Oenanthe deserti

Common migrant and winter visitor, September to early May, rarely other months. Non-breeding population estimated as 50,000-100,000.

Pied Wheatear Oenanthe pleschanka

Common migrant, February to April and August to November, rarely other months.

The rarer white-throated morph vittata is recorded annually in very small numbers.

Eastern Black-eared Wheatear Oenanthe melanoleuca

Uncommon migrant mid-February to April, very rare September to November, rarely other months.

- Hybrid Pied x Black-eared Wheatear *Oenanthe pleschanka x melanoleuca* can appear near-identical to Finsch's Wheatear, but tail and wing pattern typically deviates from Finsch's. Several records of such hybrids on spring migration have been noted in the UAE.

Northern Wheatear Oenanthe oenanthe

Fairly common to common migrant mid February to early May, uncommon August to November; rare December and January.

Isabelline Wheatear Oenanthe isabellina

Very common migrant and winter visitor, recorded all months. Peak migration in March/April and August/September. Non-breeding population estimated as 1,000-2,000.

Blackstart Oenanthe melanura

Purple Sunbird Cinnyris asiaticus

Common breeding resident; nomadic in summer. Breeding population estimated as 50,000-100,000.

Very common resident in urban/suburban areas; locally common in mountain wadis; popular cagebird, often released. Breeding population estimated as 10,000-20,000.

Scaly-breasted Munia Lonchura punctulata (Category C)

Uncommon Dubai and Abu Dhabi; nesting since 1993.

Grey Wagtail Motacilla cinerea

Fairly common migrant and winter visitor, late August to April, rarely May. Non-breeding population estimated as 10-50.

Western Yellow Wagtail Motacilla flava

Common migrant and localised winter visitor, though racial identification in winter often uncertain.

- White-headed Wagtail *M. flava leucocephala* very rarely reported, but very pale *beema* or, perhaps more likely possible intergrades between *beema* and *lutea* very difficult to conclusively rule out. However, well-documented records of birds that match appearance of at least some *M.f. leucocephala* on west Mongolian breeding grounds are listed below, with the caveat it may be impossible to completely eliminate possibility of *beema* x *lutea* intergrades:

Vagrant.

Cinereous Bunting Emberiza cineracea semenowi

This subspecies-group is called Cinereous Bunting (Yellow-bellied) as well as Eastern Cinereous Bunting.

One near Nad al-Sheba 8-9 Dec 1997 (SJ Aspinall et al).

Another, perhaps same bird, Emirates Golf Club, 22 Sep 1998-30 Apr 2002 (CM Saunders et al).

Spotted Thick-knee Burhinus capensis

One at Abu Dhabi; Third Crossing 25 Oct 2003-7 Feb 2004 (C Clark et al).

Black-bellied Sandgrouse Pterocles orientalis

A flock of six birds (three males, three females) on Abu al-Abyadh Island 9 Feb 1992 (RP Morris). **
One heard flying over Al Ain Camel Racetrack 3 Mar 1997 (SJ Aspinall). **

African Collared Dove Streptopelia roseogrisea

Recorded sporadically, most likely escaped birds from the pet trade.

Hawaiian Goose Branta sandvicensis

Four Zabeel Ponds 1 Jun 1989 to year end.

Two Zabeel Ponds on eggs April 1991 (per K Hyland).

Black Swan Cygnus atratus

One Das Island 19 Nov 1991 and 29 May 1992 (L Reaney).

One Al Warsan Lakes (Wimpey Pits) and Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 27 Jan 2002 to 4 Nov 2005 (T Pedersen et al).

One Qarn al-Aysh 26 Jan 2009 (ENHG).

Recorded Al Marmoom DCR since c2018 at least, where breeding.

Black-necked Swan Cygnus melanocorypha

Six Sir Bani Yas 28 Jul 1989 and 31 Aug-2 Sep 1989

Recorded Al Marmoom DCR since c2018 at least

Trumpeter Swan Cygnus buccinator

Four Yasat Sufla Island 15 Feb 2011 (P Hellyer, S Bates).

Canada Goose Branta canadensis

225 birds Eastern Lagoon 12 Jan 2013 (OJ Campbell). Small groups seen erraticially in this area since then.

Recorded Al Marmoom DCR since c2018 at least

Radjah Shelduck Tadorna radjah

One Safa Park 19 Dec 2010-14 Feb 2011 (OB Hansen et al).

One Al Warsan Lakes 26 Feb 2011 (J Iversen).

Spur-winged Goose Plectropterus gambensis

Formerly held in Sir Bani Yas collection (per SJA).

Muscovy Duck Cairina moschata

One Al Ain city 1 Mar-17 Apr 2006 (L Bailey).
One Green Mubazzarah 26 Dec 2006 (H Roberts).
One Safa Park 1 Dec 2008-23 Mar 2009 (C Temple *et al*).

Ringed Teal Callonetta leucophrys

Two Al Warsan Lakes 5 Feb 2010 (N Tovey).

Wood Duck Aix sponsa

One female Safa Park 11 May 2005 (A Ahrif).

Mandarin Duck Aix galericulata

One female Safa Park 23-24 May 2004 (D Diskin).

Helmeted Guineafowl Numida meleagris

Feral birds possibly breeding in semi-captivity; several locations.

Vulturine Guineafowl Acryllium vulturinum

One Mushrif National Park 05.03.2004 (D.A.Diskin).

California Quail Callipepla californica

One Yasat Sufla Island 15 Feb 2011 (P Hellyer, S Bates). One private island off Sila'a 3 Jun 2011 (W Mischler).

Chukar Alectoris chukar (Category A & E)

Birds outside of the Ra's al-Khaimah mountains north of Dibba and Masafi area are of feral origin and not considered to be self-sustaining. 500 birds released in the Al Ain area 2012, as well as on Sir Bani Yas.

Arabian Partridge Alectoris melanocephala

First reported Sir Bani Yas 28 Jul 1989, now common there.

One Green Mubazzarah 23 Sep-30 Nov 2007, and regular in the Jebel Hafit area 2009 onwards, up to 10,000 birds released there in 2019/20. Also introduced on private islands.

Yellow-necked Spurfowl Francolinus leucoscepus

Probably bred successfully on Abu al-Abyadh Island in 1990s. Two on private island off Sila'a 1 May 2011 (W Mischler).

Ring-necked Pheasant Phasanius colchicus

Probably breeds on Abu al-Abyadh Island, also recorded Sir Bani Yas.

Also recorded Bateen Woods, Al Wathba, Ajban Farms, Al Ain Camel Racetracks, Ghantoot and Safa Park.

Green Pheasant Phasanius colchicus versicolor

One Wadi Al Ain 9 Feb 2010 (H Roberts).

Indian Peafowl Pavo cristatus

Breeds successfully on Sir Bani Yas and in a number of gardens and hotel grounds.

Green Peafowl Pavo muticus

Recorded Jebel Ali Hotel in May 2009, where apparently breeds with Indian Peafowl, producing hybrids.

Marabou Stork Leptoptilos crumeniferus

One Al Ain area 30 Nov 2007-2 Dec 2010, joined by another Ain al-Fayda 30 Jan 2008, escaped from nearby Al Ain Zoo (H Roberts et al).

Yellow-billed Stork Mycteria ibis

Four Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 9 Jan 1999 (C Richardson).

One Zabeel Ponds/Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 11 Jul-27 Nov 1999 (C Richardson).

One Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 11 Jan 2001 (SL James).

Up to five reported Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 20 Nov 2004 onwards (T Pedersen et al).

Painted Stork Mycteria leucocephala

One Ruwais 02-03 Sep 1995 (SJ Aspinall et al).

Pink-backed Pelican Pelecanus rufescens

One Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 28 Mar 2011 (R Khan et al).

One immature Al-Zora Protected Area 20 Sep 2021 (S Taylor), probably same bird Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 28 Sep 2021 onwards (E Fakie et al).

Goliath Heron Ardea goliath

A free-flying pair nested at Al Ain Zoo 1993/94/95 and had possibly done so previously, occasionally straying to Ain al-Faydah wetlands.

A resident bird on Zirku Island from 2007 or before to at least 15 Sep 2009, presumed escape (per R Hornby).

A bird photographed near Dubai Safari Park Nov 2023, considered an escape (J Rodgers).

One Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary--Mangrove Hide Nov 2024, presumed escape (M Gochfeld).

Scarlet Ibis Eudocimus ruber

Free-flying on Sir Bani Yas, where breeding reported 1993 (juvenile observed 30 Sep-1 Oct 1993).

Hadada Ibis Bostrychia hagedash

One Dubai Pivot Fields 8 Mar 2006 (T Pedersen) and 25 Nov 2006 (D Clark).

Dark Chanting Goshawk Melierax metabates

One Abu Dhabi Island 15 Apr 1988 (JAD Chapman, D Robinson).

A caged individual on Sir Bani Yas in late 1980s and early 1990s said to have been trapped on Dalma, but provenance considered mistaken.

Arabian Bustard Ardeotis arabs

Escapees recorded.

10 birds released Sir Bani Yas autumn 2023.

White-bellied Bustard Eupodotis senegalensis canicollis

One Balghelam Island 2-15 Feb 1996, last survivor of four originally released two years previously.

Purple Swamphen (African) Porphyrio porphyrio madagascariensis

Records from Al Warsan Lakes 2005 onwards probably result frrom releases or hybrids (see under Grey-headed Swamphen in the main list).

Grey Crowned Crane Balearica regulorum

A feral population on Sir Bani Yas bred successfully in 1994.

Regularly reported in Dubai and Ra's al-Khor Wildlife Sanctuary 1996 onwards.

Blacksmith Lapwing Vanellus armatus

One free-flying Dubai--general area 3 Mar 2010 (T Pedersen et al).

One Al Warsan Lakes 24 Oct 2011 (C Temple).

African Jacana (Actophilornis africanus

One Umm Suqeim 8 Oct 2006 (K Hyland).

Pin-tailed Sandgrouse Pterocles alchata (Category C & E)

Regularly released in the deserts around Dubai, where now considered established and breeding (per SJ Aspinall).

All records prior to 2016 considered category E.

Crowned Sandgrouse Pterocles coronatus

One male Al Marmoom DCR--Duck Lake and eastern plain 5 Oct 2018 (S Kirkcaldy, M Beer), with tame groups of birds including Spotted Sandgrouse seen later.

Sporadic records in this area, as well as in Hatta, all presumed escapes.

Bred in captive breeding programs (pr P Arras, 2018).

Speckled Pigeon Columba guinea

Up to two Al Warsan Lakes 1 Apr-13 May 2005 (DA Diskin et al).

One Al Wathba Wetland Reserve 22 Jun 2005 (SJ Aspinall).

Up to three Dubai--general area 8 Apr 2008-17 Jun 2010 (J Angliss et al).

Ringed Turtle Dove Streptopelia roseogrisea 'risoria'

A domestic variant of African Collared Dove, often called Barbary Dove.

A feral population on Sir Bani Yas in the mid 1990s may longer be present.

Reports of very pale doves from various sites in the UAE might refer to this species.

Diamond Dove Geopelia cuneata

Often sold in pet markets; sometimes noted free-flying in urban centres.

Zebra Dove Geopelia striata

One Al Mamzar Park 13 Jan 2004 (DA Diskin).

Orange-breasted Green Pigeon Treron bicinctus

One Western Lagoon 21 Dec 2007 (A&I Cunningham).

Galah Eolophus roseicapilla

Often sold in pet markets; sometimes noted free-flying in urban centres.

Sulphur-crested Cockatoo Cacatua galerita

Often sold in pet markets; sometimes noted free-flying in urban centres.

Cockatiel Nymphicus hollandicus

Often sold in pet markets; sometimes noted free-flying in urban centres.

Red Lory Trichoglossus borneus

Escapees recorded.

Eastern Rosella Platycercus eximius

Often sold in pet markets; sometimes noted free-flying in urban centres.

Budgerigar Melopsittacus undulatus

Often sold in pet markets; sometimes noted free-flying in urban centres.

Plum-headed Parakeet Psittacula cyanocephala

Scarce resident in Dubai since 1996, also recorded Jebel Ali. Not to be confused with escaped Blossom-headed Parakeets in Abu Dhabi.

Blossom-headed Parakeet Psittacula roseata

Escapees recorded regularly in Abu Dhabi, rare Safa Park and Al Ain.

Rosy-faced Lovebird Agapornis roseicollis

Escapees recorded.

Fischer's Lovebird Agapornis fischeri

Escapees recorded.

Lillian's Lovebird Agapornis lilliani

Escapees recorded.

Australian King Parrot Alisterus scapularis

One Mushrif Palace Gardens 4 Feb 2012 (A&I Cunningham).

Grey Parrot Psittacus erithacus

Escapees recorded.

Nanday Parakeet Nandayus nenday

Regular Jumeirah Jun 2007-Feb 2010 (T Pedersen *et al*). One bird Ra's al-Khaimah Dec 2007 to Sep 2015 (B McKay).

Monk Parakeet Myiopsitta monachus

Two birds in a nest-like structure in Safa Park, Dubai 27 Oct 2005-7 Feb 2006. Also recorded elsewhere in the Dubai. Al Ain and Abu Dhabi area.

Red-and-green Macaw Ara chloropterus

Escapees recorded.

Speckled Mousebird Colius striatus

Three Abu Dhabi Golf & Equestrian Club 20 Jan 2006 (N Moran).

Southern Ground Hornbill Bucorvus leadbeateri

One Fujairah 10 Feb 2010 (MK Shurigi).

Rufous Treepie Dendrocitta vagabunda

One Jebel Ali Hotel 20 Mar 2003 (DA Diskin).

Large-billed Crow Corvus macrorhynchus

Recorded Abu Dhabi Island 24 May 1998 to year-end at least (R Hornby et al), presumed escaped.

Red-whiskered Bulbul *Pycnonotus jocosus* (Category C up to 2016)

Recorded quite regularly Mushrif Palace Gardens to 21 Sep 2012, singletons recorded erratically there to 14 Oct 2014 (OJ Campbell *et al*). One Al Ain Cement Factory quarries 16 Nov 2013 (P Arras).

Red-billed Leiothrix Leiothrix lutea

Escapees recorded.

Common Hill Myna Gracula religiosa

One Abu Dhabi Golf Club 13-22 Jan 1997 (SL James). One Ain al-Fayda 7 Oct 2011 (D Clark).

Crested Myna Acridotheres cristatellus

One Safa Park 28 Oct 1999, one Sharjah Rubbish Tip 11 Aug 2004 (DA Diskin).

Javan Myna Acridotheres javanicus

Several present on Sir Bani Yas in the early 1990s, with two 7 Feb 2008 (SJ Aspinall); not reported since.

Jungle Myna Acridotheres fuscus

Recorded Abu Dhabi in late 1980s, released birds failed to become established. One Abu Dhabi 8 Mar 2004.

Bali Myna Leucopsar rothschildi

One adult in Abu Dhabi's Bateen area 31 Aug 2004.

Golden-breasted Starling Lamprotornis regius

One along the Abu Dhabi International Airport road 02 Oct 1995.

Superb Starling Lamprotornis superbus (Category C & E)

Recorded Abu Dhabi 1989-90, Dubai area 2006-09, Ra's al-Khaimah 2006-07. Confirmed breeding Sharjah University City from 2005 onwards. All records prior to 2016 considered category E.

Red-crested Cardinal Paroaria coronata

One Sir Bani Yas 9 Mar 1998 (SJ Aspinall).

Black-headed Canary Alario alario

Two Dubai--general area 15 Jul 1977 (J Armitage).

Sudan Golden Sparrow Passer luteus

One Umm al-Qaiwain 23 Feb 2010 (A Dittman, M Schulz).

Lesser Masked Weaver Ploceus intermedius

Over 100 birds released ca 1984 and bred in Sharjah (Al Jazirah Park in Khor Khalid). Also recorded Zabeel Ponds and Dubai Poivot Fields.

Vitelline Masked Weaver Ploceus vitellinus

One Khalidiyah, 11-17 Oct 2008 (N Moran et al), one nest-building in Al Mamzar Park 24 Mar-7 Apr 2009 (SJ Aspinall, T Pedersen).

Rueppell's Weaver Ploceus galbula

One Abu Dhabi--Third Crossing 9 May 2004 (C Clark) and Abu Dhabi--Hilton/Spinneys area 22 Sep 2006 (A&I Cunningham).

Village Weaver Ploceus cucullatus

Recorded nesting in Abu Dhabi near Hotel Intercontinental 2005 onwards; still present and building nests in that area, June 2020. Also recorded Dubai Pivot Fields Jun-Sep 2006.

Chestnut Weaver Ploceus rubiginosus

One Ra's al-Khaimah Airport 26 Mar 1995, one Jebel Ali Hotel, November 1996, up to two Khalidiyah 12 May 2006-8 Nov 2008.

Baya Weaver Ploceus philippinus

Recorded Ruwais 12-13 Oct 1995.

One male Dubai Pivot Fields 23 Aug 2006 (T Pedersen) and up to six same place 15 Jul-8 Aug 2007 and 16 July 2009 (D Wilby et al).

One Wamm Farms 27 Aug 2010 (SL James).

One Wadi Al Ain 26 Sep 2011 (M Barth et al).

Bengal Weaver Ploceus benghalensis

Up to two Dubai Pivot Fields 1-24 Sep 2006, 10 Jul-10 Aug 2007 and 15 Aug 2008, nest-building observed 2007 (D Wilby et al). One Wamm Farms 4-10 Sep 2010 and 20 May 2011 (SP Lloyd et al).

Red-headed Quelea Quelea erythrops

One Dubai Pivot Fields 6 Sep 2013 (S Sreevalsan).

Red-billed Quelea Quelea quelea

Two pairs Hamraniyah Fields 15 Dec 1995, recorded Dubai Pivot Fields 2006-2009 and on Abu Dhabi Island 2010.

Southern Red Bishop Euplectes orix

Recorded Abu Dhabi, Dubai, Ramtha Rubbish Tip, Wasit Nature Reserve and Ruwais, 2000-2021.

Zanzibar Bishop Euplectes nigroventris

One Dubai Pivot Fields 24 Sep-21 Oct 2006 (T Pedersen et al) and same place 15 Aug 2008 (S Jahan).

Black-winged Bishop Euplectes hordeaceus

Recorded Abu Dhabi Golf and Equestrian Club and Wasit Nature Reserve, 2007-2009.

Yellow-crowned Bishop Euplectes afer

Up to 13 birds of the nominate subspecies recorded Dubai Pivot Fields 2005-2011 (T Pedersen, OB Hansen *et al*). Also recorded Al Wasit Nature Reserve 2006-2009 (N Tovey *et al*) and Abu Dhabi Island 2005 (A Twyman).

White-winged Widowbird Euplectes albonotatus

One Dubai Pivot Fields 14 Oct 2006 (N Tovey, C Temple).

Red-collared Widowbird Euplectes ardens

Four Al Mamzar Park 8 Dec 2002 (OB Hansen *et al*) and one 31 May 2004 (DA Diskin). One Dubai Pivot Fields 20 Apr 2006 (N Tovey).

Lavender Waxbill Estrilda caerulescens

One Abu Dhabi Golf and Equestrian Club 16 Jan 2010 (P Jaquith).

Common Waxbill Estrilda astrild

Three Jumeirah 17 Jan 2007 (T Pedersen) and four Al Jimi Oasis 30 Dec 2010 (H Roberts).

Blue-capped Cordonbleu *Uraeginthus cyanocephalus*

One Mushrif Palace Gardens 30 Oct 2004 (NJ Moran).

Zebra Waxbill Sporaeginthus subflavus

One Wamm Farms 18 Nov 2005 (N Moran et al). One The Meadows 1 Apr 2006 (B Beardsall).

Green Avadavat Sporaeginthus formosus

One Eastern Lagoon 12 May 1989 (P Hellyer).

Red Avadavat Amandava amandava

Reported nesting Sharjah City 1988, recorded Ramtha Rubbish Tip and Zabeel area until 1997. Records from Dubai Pivot Fields and Wamm Farms 2006-2011.

Tricolored Munia Lonchura malacca

One Dubai Pivot Fields 2 Jan 2006 (T Pedersen, J Wilkins).

White-headed Munia Lonchura maja

One Dubai Pivot Fields 2 Dec 2009 (M Smiles).

Chestnut Munia Lonchura atricapilla

Recorded Safa Park, Zabeel area, Emirates Golf Club, Dubai Creek Park, Bateen Woods.

Java Sparrow Padda oryzivora

Sporadic records Abu Dhabi Island and Dubai City 1977-2010.

Also recorded Sila'a--general area.

Pin-tailed Whydah Vidua macroura
